Well it's crazy to think that we're half-way through this half-term already! There has, as always, been lots going on in school so please make sure you keep up to date by following us on our various social media sites. On Wednesday, a group of staff accompanied 76 children to take part in this year's Young Voices concert at the O2 in London. Last year, we took 56 children so it's great to see how popular this trip has become over the past few years, I was very sad that I couldn't go with them this year! As you can imagine, organising an event of this scale takes a lot of

time so huge thanks to Miss Cronin and Miss Howard for organising this fantastic opportunity for the children and for giving up so much of their time to rehearse with the choir. Also, thanks must go to the staff who accompanied the trip – it was a long day!

Enrichment Day: Our next Enrichment Day, where all children come off timetable to focus on a themed day, will be on Friday 2nd February. All children are asked to wear a coloured T-shirt that matches their House on that day instead of their normal school shirt, tie, jumper etc. They should wear the rest of their uniform as normal (ie trousers/skirt, school shoes). If you are unsure of your child's House colour, just look at the stripe on their school tie! The focus of our second Enrichment Day of this academic year will be EDIJ (Equity, Diversity, Inclusion and Justice). Look out for the House newsletters following this day for an insight into the kind of themes and topics that will have been covered.

Swimming Pool update: Everyone at Frimley and The Prospect Trust remains committed to finding the best solution for the school's swimming pool and is currently exploring different options to address the issues it currently has with the pumping system and the plant room. However, it is unlikely that these will be addressed in the short term, and therefore the pool will not re-open for swimming classes during the 2023/24 academic year. While this decision is disappointing, it does not compromise the school's ability to comply with the National Curriculum on swimming and, although we will not be providing any children with swimming lessons this academic year, every child - current and future - will receive access to a swimming pool and swimming classes during their time at Frimley Junior School.

Uniform: As we all know it has been incredibly cold recently but we ask for your support in ensuring your child continues to wear the correct uniform, including school shoes and not trainers. We are also seeing an increasing number of children wearing "skins" under their grey school shorts and white school shirt instead of trousers and a jumper/cardigan. If your child is still cold when wearing grey school trousers and school jumper etc then of course it's fine to wear "skins" underneath but these should not be worn as a replacement ie if it's too cold to wear grey shorts and a short sleeved white school shirt, then a jumper/cardigan and trousers should be worn instead. "Skins" are fine to wear under PE shorts on their PE day as an alternative to tracksuit bottoms.


Miss Mills Recommends:




Mrs. Straud. Recommends:

Book choice: No Ballet Shoes in Syria

I have recently read 'No Ballet Shoes in Syria'. This beautifully moving story follows the dancing journey of Aya, an eleven-year-old girl, who has just arrived in Britian with her mum and baby brother. The family have had to leave their home country and their father is missing. They have nothing but the kindness of a ballet teacher, who helps Aya fulfil her dancing dreams.

Blurh: Aya is eleven years old and has just arrived in Britain with her mum and baby brother, seeking asylum from war in Syria. When Aya stumbles across a local ballet class, the formidable dance teacher spots her exceptional talent and believes that Aya has the potential to earn a prestigious ballet scholarship. But at the same time, Aya and her family must fight to be allowed to remain in the country, to make a home for themselves and to find Aya's father - separated from the rest of the family during the journey from Syria. With beautiful, captiwating writing, wonderfully authentic ballet detail, and an important message champianing the rights of refugees, this is classic storytelling - filled with warmth, hope and humanity.



Year 3's Trip to Butser Farm!

Last week, Year 3 went on a trip to Butser Farm. This was related to our topic of Prehistory. The children completed different activities to widen their knowledge of prehistoric life. The children enjoyed making their own jewellery, excavating artefacts, trying on clothes made from animal skins and carving chalk with flint to create their own patterns. We also had the opportunity to look at what houses would have looked like during this time and the tools used to build them. We were very lucky with the weather and the children were beautifully behaved. We will be using our experiences to support our learning for the rest of this term.
